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




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

Botswana

Chobe National Park A must see, this park is teeming with wildlife and offers the essence of an African safari. Stay in one of the many luxurious safari lodges available, and watch the hippos, crocodiles, buffalos, elephants and more along the banks of the beautiful Chobe River, life changing is an understatement, keep your camera batteries well charged!

Okavango Delta This unique area is the heart of the African wilderness, a fascinating environment that is unspoilt and breathtakingly beautiful. With its extensive wetlands, the Okavango is the largest inland delta in the world and game viewing is guaranteed all year round. 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Tipping

Botswana Safari tipping etiquette is important. Guides: \$10 per guest per day in a shared vehicle, double if a private vehicle. Trackers, valets, etc: \$5 per guest per day. General staff, cleaners, cooks, waiters, etc: \$5 per guest per day. Tips are normally given at the end of the stay and envelopes <u>are normally</u> available for this purpose.

Tanzania Tipping is not expected outside of touristic areas but is appreciated and should be given if service is good. Safari tipping is important. For drivers and/or guides \$10 per day is reasonable. For servers in lodges etc \$5-10per day is reasonable. Porters \$1-2 per bag.

Zambia Tipping is not encouraged and is considered illegal but it is still widely practiced and usually accepted if offered. Safari guides do not expect tips but will accept them if offered, usually given at the end of the stay. Best to go with your instincts re tipping whilst in Zambia.

Zimbabwe Service charge is usually included in the bill in Zimbabwe, if not add a 10% tip for good service. Porters \$1-2 per bag, hotel housekeeping \$2-3 per day. Safari tips are important, consider between \$5-10 to guides, drivers etc., per person per day. Taxis, \$3-5 for the journey depending on distance and service.

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Zambia

Wildlife & Wilderness This large, landlocked country offers some of the best African experiences around. Home to the legendary "walking safari", originated in South Luangwa National Park, many lodges and camps offer excellent guided tours with special up close and personal encounters with wildlife. Hippos, crocs, zebras, impalas and spectacular bird life are just a few of the sights. Known as the real Africa, Zambia has a raw edge to it that just makes it all that more special.

Victoria Falls An awe inspiring sight of pure beauty and grandeur on the Zambezi River, bordering Zambia and Zimbabwe. The local name for the falls is "Mosi-oa-Tunya", meaning the "Smoke that Thunders". The columns of spray and mist can be seen from afar, but nothing beats a close up view in peak season of 546 million cubic meters of water plummeting every minute into a gorge 100 meters below. Stay in nearby Livingstone, enjoy this historical town and take a sunset cruise on the Zambezi, an awe inspiring and memorable experience.

Adventure at the Falls If adrenalin pumping activities are your passion then your choices are endless here...try bungee jumping off the Victoria Falls bridge or abseiling and even hanggliding, helicopter flights are available too and some of the best whitewater rafting you'll find anywhere!




Weather

Botswana's weather is hot and dry for most of the year with a rainy season that can be a little unpredictable, running through the hot summer months from October/November through to March/April. May generally marks the beginning of winter, with clear sunny days and cold nights. The dry winter season from April to October is the best time to see game animals.

Tanzania lies close to the equator so seasonal variations in temperatures are not very extreme. The weather is dry and pleasant between June and September but can be late for the major wildlife attractions in the Serengeti, the wildebeest migration usually begins during the wet season and culminates in the famous river crossings in July. The coastal areas can be quite warm and have relatively high humidity, with average island temperatures between 27-29°C.

Zambia has a mild tropical climate and is warm nearly all year round, it does have three separate seasons though, May to August is cool and dry, September to November is hot and dry, while December to April is hot and wet. Safaris are available all year around, Victoria Falls is most impressive toward the end of the rainy season in April, although viewing the entire scope of the falls is better when the water is lowest at



Zimbabwe generally has a moderate and pleasant climate, summer temperatures from November through to April with hot sunny days between 30-35°C. Winter starts around May and goes through to October, it can be considered quite cold. Rain is most prevalent in the summer. Best times to view wildlife is at the end of the dry winter season around September and October.



An elephant's trunk has about 150,000 muscles and no bones, they can hold around 15 litres of water in their trunks at one time.

Cheetahs can reach speeds of 110kph with maximum strides of up to 6 and 7m in length.

The name "hippopotamus" comes from two Greek words that mean" river horse".

A hippopotamus is born underwater. The mother helps her baby to the surface to breathe.

Life changing experiences...

Zimbabwe

Hwange National Park The largest reserve in Zimbabwe, Hwange boasts more than 100 different animal species and over 400 species of birds, if that isn't enough it's also famous for being home to 30,000 elephants. The local lodges offer walking and game drives that allow you the opportunity to see giraffes, rhinos, lions, leopards, hyena, buffalos and so many other species. The colourful carpet of seasonal wild flowers that appear with the first rains give a richness to the already abundant sights that this part of Africa has to offer.

Facts for the traveller...

Transportation

Botswana Most tourists will be associated with a safari tour whilst in Botswana and find taking any public transport unnecessary, however, there is a fairly good train network that offers an interesting way to see the country, best not to be in a crowded carriage. Buses are a little unreliable but can be used. Taxis are available in limited numbers in Gaborone and Francistown, shared taxi services are common. Private car rental is popular in Botswana, although can be quite expensive.

Tanzania As with many African countries public transport should be used with some caution, the Scandinavia Express Service runs buses in and around the



country, check with your hotel on reliability and schedules. Mini buses ("dalla-dallas") are a cheap way to get about but not for the faint at heart. Taxis are available, choose wisely and discuss the price before setting off. The ferry service between Dar es Salaam and Zanzibar is regular and reliable.

Zambia Organized tours and safaris will offer the most comfortable form of transportation. Zambian buses are quite good, although they can get crowded, and distances can be quite long. Minibuses run on the shorter routes. Taxis are readily available in the town of Livingstone, negotiate the price, some taxis will be happy to arrange for half day or full day rates if needed.

Zimbabwe Blue Arrow Bus Company operates a luxury coach service throughout Zimbabwe that is recommended for tourists, train travel is not as well maintained nor serviced, minibus travel is also not very highly recommended. Taxis are available and quite often used to visit Livingstone in Zambia and the Victoria Falls, they can be called from your hotel or found in major tourist sites.

Health & Security

Some African countries do have a prevalence of Malaria and Yellow Fever, make sure to check with the relevant Embassies regarding any

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required vaccinations, certificates or recommended preventive medicine.

As with many places in Africa and around the world it is always best to check on local advice regarding security and safety for tourists preferably before planning the trip.

Transportation

The green and yellow "City Hopper" bus in Nairobi is the most reliable and cleanest bus company in operation, avoid the Matatus (microbuses). Taxis are available, best to take them from your hotel but they can be found at taxi stands, some fare negotiations may be required.

Home to awe inspiring nature and wildlife...

Kenyan safaris are the most amazing, enlightening and touching experiences you can imagine. The Masai Mara Game Reserve and Tsavo National Park are the jewels of Kenya's wildlife viewing. So much to see and do, all with the safety of experienced guides who will introduce you to the incredible world of animals in the wild... visiting a city zoo pales in comparison once you've experienced the wildlife here. The beauty of the Kenya is awe inspiring, from the highlands to the coast, the lakes and rivers, the tropical forests and the beaches of Mombasa, the country is truly breathtaking.

Life changing experiences...

Masai Mara Game Reserve Experience the annual wildebeest migration from the Serengeti, arriving in Kenya between July & August until October. Over a million animals, wildebeest, gazelle, zebras and more gather and make the trek, braving the rule of the wild in their annual quest to find new pastures. Hippos and large crocodile lay in wait for a meal as they cross the Mara River, the final obstacle on their trek. A sight to behold, and an experience to remember.

Visit Mombasa Kenya's second largest city offers a diverse cultural experience, former Portuguese, Arab and British settlers all left a lasting influence on the city's food, architecture, and people. The exotic beaches of north and south Mombasa are some of the best in Africa and possibly the world, with diverse marine life, world class hotels and friendly people, it is certainly a destination not to be missed.

Underwater safaris! Kenya's east coast is becoming increasingly popular as a dive destination, catch sight of a green sea turtle or if you're very lucky see the whale sharks, the gentle giants of the sea. There are a number of excellent dive sites, well worth a visit if you are a dive enthusiast.

Facts for the traveller...

Weather

Hottest months are December to March, coastal areas are tropical with high humidity in April & May. Nairobi has a pleasant climate throughout the year, temperatures are higher at Lake Victoria with high rainfall. Winter, June and July can be quite cool, layered clothing is advised.

Stay at a Luxury Safari Lodge Tsavo National Park's massive area and wide range of landscapes makes this an ideal place for a varied wildlife safari. See the open plains, well known for its elephant herds, and ideal for finding lion, impala, kudu and possibly rhinos, buffalo & giraffe are often found as well. Visit Mzima Springs and you might catch a glimpse of hippos swimming from the underwater observatory.

Shopping A wealth of fabulous gifts, souvenirs, artifacts, jewellery, semi precious stones, beads, beautiful fabric wraps and wood carvings are all available here and represent the cultural side of Kenya. Nairobi, the "safari capital", has many open markets around the city. The Masai Market brings arts and crafts from all over to one single venue for you to bargain for, well worth having a look.

Best time to go

Main tourist season is January to February, hot and driest weather is during June to October with the Wildebeest migration.

There are over 40 tribes in Kenya, each has its own language, style of dress and traditional foods.

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Transportation

Buses and taxis are popular forms of transport in Mauritius, buses can get a little crowded but worth the experience! Try to avoid the rush hour, traffic jams are popular and the roads outside of the city and towns can be a little rough. Taxis do not operate on meters so make sure you agree on the price before starting out. Hiring a car is popular in Mauritius, note that they drive on the left.

Shopping hours Mon - Sat:9.30am to 7.30pm (most cities) Some shops open on Sundays until noon.

Tipping Not compulsory, but can be appreciated due to the low salaries, there are no strict rules here, it's recommended to tip according to the service given.

Life changing experiences...

Drive the Island Rental cars are easily available on Mauritius, try a different beach every day, there are many to enjoy at your own pace. The island is not too big and the central areas have lots to offer, roads can be rather rough in some areas and signs are challenging but if it's a little independence and adventure that you're looking for then this is the way to go.

Visit Port Louis The capital and main port of Mauritius. This lively city has lots to see and do, take a walk and you'll find plenty of character with fine colonial architecture and past elegance. Enjoy the food, the restaurants here offer a wonderful variety of food to choose from and if nightlife is on your holiday list this is the place to be.

Explore the sea Snorkel or take a glass bottom boat out to see the fish and coral in Blue Bay, the only marine park in Mauritius. Diving enthusiasts will enjoy fabulous coral reefs with a huge range of underwater treasures, the seas here in Mauritius never fail to surprise. If fishing is your passion charter a boat, deep sea fishing is very popular in these special waters.

Sail the sea Take a trip on the "Isla Mauritia", an historical double mast Spanish schooner built in 1852, she sails on Wednesdays and Saturdays (best to

Weather

Summer and the hottest time of the year is between December and March, average temperature is 30°C, note that cyclones do occur during this period, it can be a little humid and rainy. For a cooler holiday, August and September have an average temperature of 24°-26°C, it can get cooler at night,

Transportation

There are train and bus services between the main cities, both of which are recommended. City taxis provide the main transport as distances between attractions are relatively small, most are walkable within cities such as Marrakesh. Make sure to negotiate the fare before you begin, an important point to remember. Use "Small" taxis to travel shorter distances around the cities. If you don't mind sharing then try a "Grand Taxi" when taking trips outside of the cities, they take more than one passenger and can be convenient, make sure to bargain for your chosen destination.

Start at Mahé The largest island in the Seychelles. Visit the local market in the capital Victoria, a busy and bustling food market full of interesting sights, sounds, smells and tastes, or for a change of pace spend an hour or two in the Botanical Gardens, see the famous 'Coco de Mer' trees and feed the giant tortoise. Take a beach break and head to the famous Beau Vallon beach in the northwest, with an interesting market just over the road. Plenty to see, plenty to do.

Praslin The second largest island in the Seychelles features the superb Vallée de Mai, a tropical glade with towering palms, rare and exotic birds and home to the legendary double nutted Coco de Mer palm. Don't miss the beautiful beaches of Anse Lazio and Anse Georgette, both on the top 10 list of the world's best beaches in recent years. Simply paradise on earth.

La Digue Island A short boat ride from Praslin, La Digue is a slow paced, laid back island, if it's relaxation you're looking for, this is the place to be. One of the most photographed islands in the Seychelles, it is home to the Anse Source d'Argent, a beautiful beach famous for its stunning white sands and giant boulders on and around the beach, truly breathtaking.

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Weather

Always warm, without weather extremes, average temperatures range between 24 and 32°C. From October to March the sea is generally calm and the weather warm and humid. January and February are the wetter months. May to September are drier and cooler, seas can be less calm towards the end of this period.

Best time to go

An all year round destination. October to November and March to April are the most pleasant.

For Nature Lovers Take the time to explore, these islands are home to some of the rarest species of wildlife and plant life in the world, they are literally a living museum of natural history. Transportation

A public bus system is available on Mahé and Praslin, not as punctual as it could be it is still a cheap way to get around the islands. Taxis are available and can be taken from the street or taxi stands, it should be noted that renting a car can be cheaper than taxis. La Digue does not have public transport, there are a few cars but ox carts are the most popular form of transport, well recommended!

Table Mountain Catching the famous cable car to the top is a must! Starting at just over 350m above sea level the cable car will take you to the upper station at around 1000m, the views are spectacular and hard to beat. Check the weather for clouds and wind, best times are usually early morning or late afternoon. Well worth it!

Constantia Wine Route If a good wine is on your holiday list then take a trip just 20 minutes outside of Capetown. Tastings and quality restaurants for lunch or dinner are available, as well as excellent overnight accommodation. This whole area is breathtakingly beautiful with "Groot Constantia" the first and finest example of Dutch architecture furnished with most exquisite antiques. Harvest season for the grapes is between January and April, the vineyards are at their most beautiful from October to December.

Kruger National Park The largest game reserve in South Africa, Kruger is home to the "Big Five" ; lions, leopards, elephants, cape buffaloes and black rhinos, plus cheetahs, wildebeest, giraffes, antelope,

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impala and more. Southern Kruger is the most popular and has the highest animal concentration, plenty of comfortable lodges and camps to choose from, an unforgettable adventure, don't forget your camera.

Elephant Safari Ride, walk, feed and watch these magnificent animals, the Addo Elephant Park at Eastern Cape offers day safaris from Port Elizabeth, or overnight and extended lodge holidays. The park is full of wildlife and offers a unique opportunity to get up close and personal.

Transportation

Public transport in South Africa is not reliable or efficient and can be quite unsafe, not really recommended. Taxis are the best form of public transport, they are metered and are available at taxi stands or from your hotel, they can be expensive though. Take the shuttle bus to and from the airport where possible to avoid overpriced taxis. The open top "Hop On Hop Off" bus in Capetown is an excellent way to get around. Car hire is very popular and worthwhile if you want to travel at your own pace.

Weather

Being in the Southern Hemisphere the seasons are the opposite, and yes you can spend Christmas on the beach! South Africa is famous for its sunshine and is a relatively dry country, with the winter months being the driest. Average temperatures range between lows of 17°C and highs of 38°C degrees in some areas. The South Coast is the most Tipping pleasant weather-wise, but can be a little windy.

Best time to go

Anytime throughout the year with Spring and autumn being ideal. Spring is recommended for vast areas of colourful wildflowers.

Weather
